



Community Drug Strategy in Action

This represents an 18.7% increase since 2013.

Risk of infection with HIV and hepatitis C

In a 2010 study conducted with people who inject drugs in Sudbury,



were **positive** for the hepatitis C virus.



On average,

108 cases of hepatitis C and

8 cases of HIV

are reported each year in Greater Sudbury.

*Sharing needles and other drug injection supplies increases the risk of contact with HIV and Hepatitis C.

About the needs assessment and feasibility study

A study, set to be completed by Spring 2020, will determine whether or not supervised consumption services would be a solution for some of our drug issues in Greater Sudbury. The study will have three parts:



people who use drugs



living in Greater Sudbury



Focus groups with a variety of people who live, work, and offer services in Greater Sudbury

What are supervised consumption services?

Supervised Consumption Services are controlled spaces where people can consume drugs under supervision in a clean and safe environment. People are provided sterile supplies and are supervised by trained staff including health care professionals. People who use the service can also receive basic medical care and referrals to other health and social services. Supervised Consumption Services can be one part of a broader community drug strategy that includes enforcement, treatment, harm reduction, and health promotion.

*In Ontario, Supervised Consumption Services are now referred to as Consumption Treatment Services.
