7.1	Early Warning	EMS Data Sharing Agreement

	System Update	A data sharing agreement has been signed between Greater Sudbury Emergency Medical Services and Public Health.
		Early Warning Framework
		PowerBI dashboard is underdevelopment. GSEMS & Public Health have met to provide feedback which will be incorporated. After further validation by EMS, data transfer protocols will be tested.
		In January, data should be available to us and be notified of alerts. Currently working with Rebecca in EMS – we are contacted when something comes up.
		Once the process is tested and finalized, Public Health will access data to check its Syndromic Surveillance Aberration Detection and Analysis Protocol. Afterward, Public Health will access EMS suspected opioid call volumes on a daily basis and monitor for alerts (threshold to be determined during testing). Public Health Sudbury & Districts CDS co-chair will be notified of alerts. This procedure may be subject to change.
		Feedback from the March 28 th Opioids workshop was received. Of the three responses collected, two-thirds indicated that everything looked good. The only suggested change was to more specifically outline the role of harm reduction from a public health perspective. A draft opioid response plan has been developed and will be circulated shortly for the steering committee to review.
		CDS is creating a response plan for CGS and are hoping to have it recommendations by March.

		Drafting Policy - criteria for drug alert
		A policy is being developed. It will be shared with the committee once it is ready. Discussion took place around when to issue a warning versus an alert. Alerts have currently been issued same-day. Many approvals are required from various community partners to issue alerts, and the process seems to be working well.
		If an alert is issued on the weekend, individuals are to contact PHSD on call who will then make the necessary contacts to issue the alert.
7.2	Needle Disposal Bin	Currently, there are 7 needles bins installed in the downtown core: • Hnatyshyn Park • Marymount green stairs • Corner of Eva Avenue and Kathleen Street • Mackenzie Library • Memorial Park • Leslie Street Bridge (Entrance of the Trans Canada Trail) • Energy Court (behind the Beer Store on Lorne Street) The bin located at 200 Larch Street was removed from that site when the ownership for that building was transferred to CMHA. We are currently waiting for final approval from the City to relocate the bin temporarily to Durham Street near Christ the King Church which is housing the Off the Street Shelter. Once the shelter closes its doors in the spring, the needle bin will be relocated. Due to the high amount of discarded sharps in public areas, a need has been determined for the acquisition of three additional bins to be installed in community hotspots. A business case to acquire funding for the additional bins has been submitted to City Council for review for the 2019 budget. Currently, they are working with a local company to empty the bins however, it would be important to work with them to better collect stats regarding the content of the bins. Needle bins are currently emptied quarterly. However, 3 of 8 bins are

	(Update)	Overall, 26 (10 since the last report) agencies have been trained, receiving the "train the trainer" model for the distribution of naloxone. Also, selected Public Health Sudbury & Districts' staff have been trained both in distribution and administration. In total, 158 individuals have been trained across Sudbury and districts.
		Up to now, 677 naloxone kits have been sent out to agencies with which Public Health Sudbury & Districts has a Memorandum of Understanding for the administration or distribution of naloxone.
		HSN's Emergency Department is now trained so we can expect to see the distribution numbers rise significantly. Volunteer Fire Fighters could benefit from training.
		The group discussed the need to create a process to have expired naloxone kits returned and replaced since naloxone has a one-year shelf life.

7.8	Provincial Direction	The province announced the re-branding of SCS and OPS to "Consumption and Treatment Services." Additional restrictions on-site operations and placement are noted, and there is a cap on how many sites will be accepted (21 sites). This, however, only denotes those sites that will receive provincial funding. It is noted that four other PHUs are leading or supporting SCS-NAFS in their communities despite this cap. Should the cap be increased or removed, upon review of the CTS guidelines, the methodology used for our SCS-NAFS will include the required data and consultations as outlined in the CTS application form.
	Needs Assessment and Feasibility Study (NAFS)	With thanks to our CDS-EC leads for reviewing the RFQ, it was posted on November 9, followed by a news release on November 13. The Research Officer will have responsibilities for primary data collection, secondary data collection, data analysis, community advisory committee participation and budgeting. The deadline for quote submissions is December 14. Q&As will be posted to our website for all submitting parties to view by November 29. A panel to review quotes will be convened consisting of A. Zbar, A. Lekun, R. St Onge, one peer and one community partner from the community advisory committee. Dr. Zbar shared that they will be using a toolkit that was developed in BC for the survey and the focus groups. An RFQ has been issued and closes December 18, 2018. More

8.1	Crisis Opioid Town Hall November 8, 2018 – hosted by Jamie	A Town Hall was hosted by Jamie West (MPP) on November 8. Dr. Zbar (PHSD), Julie Gorman (SACY), Marion Quigley (CMHA), France Gelinas (NDP) were all panel speakers.
	West, MPP	Providing community members update on the current opioid issues our community is facing. Approximately 60 individuals were present. The CDS was present to display Naloxone and promote the work we are currently doing in the community to address the harms related to drug misuse.
		Two main issues were addressed: 1. What to do about used needles in the community? 2. What is currently being done?
		The group agreed that there a more comprehensive panel would be needed and that the event wasn't publicized very well. The venue was also quite small.
		It would be beneficial to create a media package to help members of the media report SCS information correctly.
		Dr. A. Zbar shared that CDS needs to use caution when promoting SCS issues alongside the MPP. CDS needs to focus on community issues and serve our goals and not the MPP's.
		This evening, Dr. Zbar will be presenting at the City Council meeting where CDS is requesting \$60K to help fund the NAFS. CMHA, LIN, and PHSD have also provided funding.
8.2	Preventing Problematic Substance Use in Youth Chief Public Health Officer's Report	S. Lacle shared that the report was excellent. She thanked M. Cotnoir for moving it forward and suggested the group have a look at the report before the next meeting.
8.3	Volunteers	There have been some requests to volunteer for CDS. The group agreed that an application process would need to be created for volunteers. This would address the purpose for the request and what would like to be learned from volunteering for CDS.

The Shelter is full, and Réseau Access Network is coming once a
		month with naloxone.
