6.1	Supervised Consumption Services • Update applications • SCS Federal exemption • SCTS Provincial application • Staffing • Next Steps	The SCS at 24 Energy Court in Sudbury has received federal approval and has legal authority to operate under city funding for minimum staffing ratio. At the moment, Neil is still in the hiring process for harm reduction workers, so an opening date is uncertain. Hours will be 9am – 9pm, doors open at 10am and close at 8pm. The federal exemption is the final element required to complete the provincial application for a funded supervised consumption and treatment site. Neil Stephen shared recent photos and branding, as well as walked everyone through the process for members.	
6.2	Naloxone distribution update /	For naloxone distribution in March, PHSD and community partners in our region distributed a total of: - 1541 naloxone doses (709 kits) - There were 189 individuals trained - and 911 was called 16 times In April, PHSD and community partners in our region distributed a total of: - 763 naloxone doses (347 kits) - There were 424 individuals trained - And 911 was called 16 times In May, PHSD and community partners in our region distributed a total of: - 1117 naloxone doses (990 kits) - There were 134 individuals trained - And 911 was called 15 times

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		During the same time period last year, there were 1077 doses distributed in March, 854 in April, and 1111 in May 2021.	
		Both the naloxone articulate training model and naloxone training manual are updated in English and French. The training manual can be used for onboarding naloxone distributing agencies into the program, as well as to train and orient their staff. Seeing increase in opioid-related drug poisonings as summer months arrives.	
		Amber revealed responders find the impact can be very traumatic. Neil revealed he is trying to get more reliable drug testing for the local drug	
		supply. Laurentian has a mass spectrometer.

7.1	Enforcement pillar - Decriminalization and safer supply	 Dan sits on a provincial committee of substances that feeds information to chiefs of police of drug trends and policies. There's a well-written document from Drug Strategy Network of Ontario titled 'Solutions to end the drug poisoning crisis in Ontario' to lobby the Canadian government for 4 high-level solutions very similar to our local goals. This highlights it is not a drug problem unique to Sudbury. At the end of May, BC was granted a 3-year exemption to the CSA starting January 2023. Decriminalization of personal possession of up to a combined weight of 2.5 gm of a variety of illicit substances for personal use, in those 18+ years of age (Amber proposed increasing to a threshold of 4.5 gm). Funding for 14 different projects for treatment projects.

8.4	Enforcement and Justice	We continue to see an increase in opioid- related deaths in the community. Identifying the substances through testing is difficult since GSPS doesn't test drugs.

8.6	Opioid Surveillance Committee	 Public Health Sudbury & Districts' opioid surveillance system continues to be monitored and updated based on information from the Office of the Chief Coroner. Based on new preliminary data for 2021: From January to December 2021, there were 101 deaths in the area covered by PHSD For comparison, during the same period in 2020 there were 106 deaths, and 56 in 2019. In 2020, PHSD was found to be the region with the highest death per capita in the province. Now, preliminary data for 2021, shows PHSD's opioid-related mortality rate has been found to be the third highest in the province. Northern communities continued to have the 5 highest opioid-related mortality rates in the province in 2021, (Thunder Bay, Algoma, PHSD, Porcupine, North Bay)
