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6.1	Supervised Consumption Services • Update applications	Construction of facility still on going: - Looking to be completed end of March beginning of April. - Consumption booths have been approved by the city to be added to the site - Wooden doors are in the process of being updated to metal frames with a reinforced door. The contract between the City and PHSD is in the final stages of approval. Health Canada inspection: - Tentatively scheduled for March 30 th . - To have a site visit, the site needs to have all items fully finished (supplies, staff training, logbooks, policy manuals, vaults) Funds have been flowing from PHSD even though the agreement has not been signed between the City. The funds have been flowing for salary and for anything required that was in the original budget submitted to the City. - Réseau ACCESS Network can purchase required items (as long as in original budget) to help prevent barriers and have the site visit/site up and running in time. Provincial Application: - There were some gaps identified, and policies to continue updating. - Once Health Canada performs an inspection and authorizes us to operate as a UPHNS or CTS, then it goes to the province for the final application review. - Once final review is done, it goes to the minister for final authorization. - Site can operate as a UPHNS with funding from the City, until the

When you compare it to the final tally for 2020, 2021 saw a decrease of 49,596 syringes that were collected by SACY. For 2022, the statistics for the most recent month (February) saw SACY pick up 1,619 syringes on the ground from public property and 10,210 syringes were either drop off at SACY or collected from property owners in bulk.
