6.2	Naloxone distribution update	Naloxone distribution amongst PHSD and community partners is as follows: April 2022 - 763 naloxone doses (347 kits) - 424 individuals trained - 911 was called 16 times May 2022 - 1,117 doses (990 kits) - 134 individuals trained - 911 was called 15 times June 2022 - 967 doses (942 kits) - 124 individuals trained - 911 was called 2 times July 2022 - 1,298 doses (1,042 kits) - 117 individuals trained - 911 was called 16 times August 2022 (preliminary) - 272doses (136 kits) Comparative distribution statistics are as follows: - April 2021—854 doses - May 2021—1,111 doses	Angele Bodson

		PHSD worked with HSN on a pilot project to have naloxone available for distribution on all units, including inpatient settings. There has been notable success and positive feedback. This was the first pilot project of its kind in Ontario, access the newsletter here: Newsletter - META:PHI (metaphi.ca)	
6.3	Needle disposal bin update	The City of Greater Sudbury continues to have 14 syringe kiosks located in the downtown core, with locations chosen based on identified hot spots and recommendations from SACY (Memorial Park, Hnatyshyn Park, Madina Lane, Beech Street, and the Riverside underpass). There has been an uptake in usage in the last 30 days and the kiosk located at Energy court near the new Safe Consumption Services site has recently seen more usage prior to the opening of the SCS site. SACY continues to pick up syringes around Greater Sudbury as well as operate as a drop off site at 95 Pine Street where individuals can drop off used syringes. To date, August has been the busiest month of 2022 for SACY who has picked up or collected 31,292 syringes. The total number of syringes collected by SACY up until the end of August for 2022 is 127,857. Statistics for 2021 for the same time period, saw SACY collect 171,665 syringes. SACY has started tracking statistics for syringe collection by City of Greater Sudbury Wards. Ward 10 and 12, which cover downtown Sudbury and the Flour	Nicole MacMillan

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		Mill, have the highest number of discarded syringes picked up by SACY. If a kiosk is no longer effective in a location, it can be moved where it would see more usage.	
7.0	NEW BUSINESS		
7.1	Harm Reduction Expansion Initiative	Public Health Sudbury & Districts is actively working with the ministry and partners to expand harm reduction services being offered in our area. PHSD is using one time funding received to purchase new sharps disposal kiosks to distribute to interested partners in 2022/early 2023. These kiosks are ideal for public areas, agency buildings, parks, etc. This initiative will help keep communities safe from improper sharp and medical waste disposal. The kiosks being purchased can be seen here: Sharps Disposal Kiosk 3.0 — ECS Cares (ecscares.com) The one time funding will also be utilized to provide interested partners with harm reduction supplies to distribute to their clients and communities. As our budget is fixed and may not be able to support these initiatives long-term, we are asking partners to continue to seek alternative funding sources for syringes. Exciting progress is being made with numerous First Nations communities in the Manitoulin and Sudbury districts. We also have relationships being built with various businesses and organizations in our catchment area to make these services accessible to our community members, especially those in our more remote and rural settings.
