6.1	Supervised Consumption Services • Update on application and UPHNS • Sounding the alarm to council • Education campaign	Application There have been conversations with those at the isolation shelter located at The Four Sisters Motel which are trying to put up an urgent public health needs site. There needs to be a quick turn around so people can provide services for the SCS. There is a one-year term for communities needing this immediately. It has been a challenge to find a location as 30 potential locations were looked at. There has been issues with accessibility, zoning, and people not wanting to host services. STOPS is an unsanctioned site that has received pushback from the community. Council UPHNS does not have any funding, city staff were asked to put together a report which is going to council today. Funding for a permanent site can take anywhere from 6 months to one year, and since something is needed immediately, that is the hope with the application.

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		Education campaign Campaign is almost ready to go, but it is important to launch this when the services are ready. The North is disproportionately affected by the opioid crisis. Northern Medical Officers of Health came together 2 weeks ago about Northern Strategy about opioid crisis, pan northern strategy to be presented at members of the province. The hope is to connect with front line workers. K. Gharty shared that STOPS Sudbury has been in touch with locations in Timmins, North Bay and Sault Ste Marie and that committee has discussed how things are going at each location, as well as how to support each other. This has all been happening at a grassroots level and the plan is to keep it that way. A lot of cities are fighting for permanent SCS, and it is important to keep in mind that this is the beginning of a long fight for this to happen.	
6.2	Naloxone Distribution Update Réseau ACCESS Network PHSD Pharmacies Update on EMS distribution	A. Fritz shared that Réseau ACCESS Network distributed 500 naloxone kits in the month of May. A lot of great connections have come from this. 822 naloxone kits have been distributed from community partners. K. Gharty stated that STOPS is running out of naloxone frequently as people are taking 3-4 kits at a time. Numbers of naloxone kits were 800 for the quarter, whereas more than 500 are now needed in a month. In April, PHSD and community partners in our region distributed 822 naloxone kits. Pharmacies total naloxone kit distribution from January- March is 12,361. District EMS is starting to distribute kits. Sudbury EMS stated that 30 kits are distributed every month, which does not include what is administered to the public. 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		New areas of HSN are distributing naloxone, including acute inpatient psychiatry, as well as 6 South and 5 South. An HSN pilot project is currently underway as HSN is one of two hospitals distributing naloxone in hospital.	
6.3	Needle Disposal Bin Update	There are 14 needle bins across CGS. The busiest is Memorial Park. Normally bins are emptied every 4 weeks, whereas Memorial Park needs emptying every 2 weeks due to overflowing. There are decals from public health on the bins now that addresses how to reduce the risk of overdosing on opioids and how to use a naloxone kit. From January 2021-May 2021, SACY collected 125,000 needles. There were 209,000 needles collected off the ground in 2020. It appears that the bins are not being utilized as much as they were last year. In February 2020 SACY picked up 68,000 needles whereas in February 2021, 8900 were picked up.	Action: A. 6.4	Empowerment Council	COVID has put a pause on this. There is nothing to report at this time.	
6.5	Opioid Poisoning Response Plan – follow up	Agreements were sent to organizations for signatures and contact numbers for agencies for evenings and weekends. There was a warning put out for THC Gold. STOPS is not a part of this team.	Action: if any members have not signed the agreement, please sign.

7.1	Mayor's Task Team Update	There was a press conference over a month ago on SCS. Discussions about location, narrowing it down, etc	

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7.2	Data from the coroner's office for 2020	The Coroner's Office released statistics on opioid-related deaths for communities across the province. Public Health Sudbury & District was found to have 105 opioid-related deaths in 2020 compared to 56 in 2019, making Public Health Sudbury & Districts' region the highest rate of opioid-related deaths in the province. In fact, the top five regions with the highest rates of opioid-related deaths in Ontario all take place in the Northeastern regions. PHSD rate: 52.4 Ontario rate: 16.4 There has been an 87.4% increase in opioid deaths. Northern Ontario was already the highest prior to the pandemic.	
7.3	Evaluating the CDS Framework	Our suggestion, evaluation of the framework so it will help plan our long-term work. In the meantime, work on other things (UPHNS app, location search, anti- stigma campaign, safe supply decisions and planning).

8.1	Health Promotion and Prevention	Nothing to report.	
8.2	Treatment	No one was present, therefore no meeting occurred.	
8.3	Harm Reduction	A. Fritz stated there was a meeting on Friday and J. Joliet gave an update on safe supply. There is still work happening with that. August 31 is International Overdose Awareness Day. Réseau ACCESS Network is organizing something for this.	
8.4	Enforcement and Justice	T. Marassato states that there are still challenges due to COVID, and that there are issues with court cases. There are people from Southern Ontario bringing drugs into Northern Ontario. Departments in North Bay, Timmins, Sault Ste Marie, Sudbury & Thunder Bay are working together to identify groups from Southern Ontario who are supplying opioids.	

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		There were samples of THC gold that were acquired, and they are getting tested now. Results should be back in 3-4 weeks.	
8.5	Communications Working Group	No meeting since January	
8.6	Opioid Surveillance Committee	PHAC grant received, and it was used to do work on surveillance dashboard. Changes and improvements still need to be made. There will be a presentation in September on the usefulness and increasing users.

9.1	Report: Preliminary patterns in circumstances surrounding opioid-related deaths in Ontario during the Covid-19 pandemic	The coroner's office has been contacted to get data specifically for Northern Ontario. There are a lot of questions regarding where people are dying from overdoses. K. Gharty stated that members are asking about what happens with inmates with substance use issues who leave prison. Getting statistics would help to better direct services for people leaving prison. A. Fritz stated that there was a mass release of inmates from a local jail and a gap in helping them transition to life outside of prison. A pamphlet with information regarding services available, as well as where to find support to decrease the chance of an overdose was given to those being released.	Action: Public Health to request stat on inmates leaving prison Action: A. Fritz to provide K. Gharty with pamphlet once translated. Note: not to be shared publicly until stated.
