Reasons




- Trades work is physically demanding and stressful. Trades workers often use substances like drugs and alcohol to celebrate or relax after work.
- Injury and pain are common. To cope, trades workers often use drugs and alcohol for pain relief. This is how some workers get introduced to opioids.
- "Men are often expected to not talk about their substance use or mental health problems. This makes them less likely to ask for help when they need it."

Mental health



- In Canada, persons 15 years of age and older that use opioid pain medication, have 2.5 times higher odds of problematic drug use if they identify as having unmet emotional, mental health needs or problems with substances compared to those persons without such needs.
- Problematic use was more likely for people reporting fair or poor mental health (21%) compared with those who perceived good (9.4%) or excellent mental health (6.6%).

Significant factors associated with problematic use of opioid pain relief medications among the household population, Canada, 2018 (statcan.gc.ca)

"Social connectedness has been shown to be health protective. Instability of connections, including unemployment (a period without usual contact with a workplace, employer, co-workers, or clients), has been associated with substance dependence, misuse, and harms."
