		Recent updates to the Ontario Naloxone Program are that the French River Fire and Sudbury's Centre for Transitional Care are being onboarded into the program.

		The pharmacy data also shows a total increase in requested injectable naloxone throughout the months.	
		As of June 1, Bill 88 came into effect. The Occupational Health and Safety Act requires an employer to have naloxone on hand if they have reason to believe that an employee is at risk for an overdose. This	
		requires an employer to provide and maintain naloxone kits, as well as have someone trained in administering	

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		naloxone. Training is provided by the Canadian Red Cross and St. John's Ambulance for free for two employees online.

		Once the presentation was completed, the city council passed a resolution to host a local leadership summit focusing on the toxic drug crisis in Greater Sudbury.	
		A motion was shared to highlight that the opioid mortality rates in the city are increasing despite the numerous multisector substance use prevention, harm reduction treatment and enforcement efforts. In turn, it was suggested that there is a need for intensification of leadership action, such as a local leadership summit.	
		The PHSD BOH met June 15 <sup>th</sup> where the Public Health Sudbury and Districts board approved a motion endorsing a recommendation by the Executive Committee.  The motion directs the Medical Officer of Health, Dr. Penny Sutcliffe, to ensure Public Health helps organize a local leadership summit to address the opioid crisis.
